

First Episode Psychosis (FEP) Clinical Guideline

MVP Health Care® (MVP), as part of its continuing Quality Improvement Program, has adopted the National Institute of Mental Health's (NIMH) Evidence-Based Treatments for First Episode Psychosis: Components of Coordinated Specialty Care¹ guideline for the treatment of individuals with first episode psychosis. Impact of the Condition

Approximately 100,000 adolescents and young adults in the United States experience first episode psychosis each year with a peak onset occurring between 15 to 25 years of age², although symptoms can first present in individuals up to the age of 35. Symptoms can negatively affect a young person's ability to achieve social, academic and vocational goals, and, as a result, contribute to life-long disability.

Summary of the NIMH Guideline

An abundance of data supports the value of early intervention following the first episode of psychosis and demonstrated improvement in symptoms and restoration of adaptive functioning in a manner superior to standard of care. Additionally, studies have shown that it is common for a person to have psychotic symptoms for more than a year before receiving treatment and reducing this duration of untreated psychosis is important². As such, in 2014 legislative funds were provided to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to support the development of early psychosis treatment programs. The purpose of these treatment models is to improve symptoms, reduce relapse episodes and prevent deterioration and disability among individuals suffering from psychotic illness. Coordinated Specialty Care (CSC) was developed as a team-based, collaborative, recovery-oriented approach involving clients, their family members and team members. CSC emphasizes establishing a positive therapeutic alliance and shared decision making with clients, as well as coordinating with primary medical care providers. The core components of services include individual/group psychotherapy; family support and education; psychopharmacology treatment; supported employment/education; and case management. Treatment goals are best retained when individuals are engaged for up to five years post-psychosis onset.
